The former concertmaster <u>was forced out</u>, <u>leaving bitter feelings behind</u>, and <u>the long search for a replacement</u> concluded with not one, not two, but <u>four permanent concertmasters</u> who will divide the leadership duties among themselves. A lawsuit filed by a violinist claiming <u>"intentional emotional distress arising out of the hostile environment and harassment ... over a long and extended period of time" tickled the interest of *The New York Times* in late 2007 (and generated a number of <u>letters to the editor in response</u>), although for us locals, <u>it's old news</u>. (<u>The lawsuit was dismissed</u> in early 2008.)</u>
