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This Web site is not for beginners. I try to write for advanced programmers, and if you're not an advanced programmer, then you'll just have to accept that there will be times you are baffled by what I write. COM weak QueryInterface would be somewhere at the graduate research level. Stuff so esoteric, nobody would actually need to know it.

To be honest, I don't think I've written anything truly advanced in a long time. It's all been fairly intermediate for the past few years. People don't seem to mind too much, so I'll just keep it going.

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
